

FROM THE CUPOLA

Happy New Year! PSRMA is entering its sixteenth year with the expectation of achieving many long sought goals during 1979. I personally wish to thank all members who worked so hard during 1978 to put PSRMA on a firmer foundation. Without your commitment and dedication, PSRMA would not have progressed toward the ultimate goal of a permanent railroad museum in San Diego County.

We can all be proud that our museum is a successful organization devoted to the avocational study, preservation and operation of vehicles that utilize a steel wheel on a steel rail. PSRMA's membership comprises quite a crew, each involved in pursuing their own interests in the furtherance of museum goals, be it history, restoration, collecting, writing, conducting excursions, operating equipment, model building, or just plain railfanning: ferroequinologists all!

Some of the highlights of museum activity during 1978 were; Membership grew 30% to 555 members at year's end. The Railfan Patrol became an officially sanctioned activity of PSRMA, proving a valuable asset to railroaders and adding to the positive image of our museum, as well as railfans in general. Many large and small donations of historic items were received, ranging from old photographs to four ex-Navy boxcars. Contributions of funds to insure the survival of our many artifacts were received as well. The Embarcadero exhibit continues to be an important San Diego attraction. Two major excursions, Creel and Puerto Penasco, earned \$7,400, our best year ever. Purchase of the William Carberry collection of railroad books, magazines, photographs, timetables and blueprints greatly expanded our research library.

The museum restoration crew made great strides toward restoring the equipment stored at NAS Miramar, finally getting the upper hand on car #1509 and car #576, as well as making significant progress on the Shay and the Army kitchen car. PSRMA continues to host groups of children and senior citizens at Miramar. There was increased attendance at the general meetings, taxing the capacity of the meeting room, with over seventy persons attending the October meeting.

We continue to hold encouraging discussions with the Metropolitan Transit Development Board (MTDB) regarding our use of property in Campo for the museum headquarters; hopefully, this matter will be resolved in early 1979. The MTDB approved an agreement with Kyle Railways, Inc. to operate freight service on the SD&AE Railway. A provision of the agreement allows the operation of occasional excursion service. Financially, the museum finished the year in the black, ending 1978 with \$16,178 in the bank, an increase of \$7,138 over last year's ending balance. 1978 has been our best year ever!

During 1979 PSRMA will continue its active pursuit of a site for our museum headquarters, concentrating on MTDB-SD&AE and adjacent property in the Campo area. Additionally, the La Mesa Depot museum project may break ground, giving us a long needed metropolitan location. Of course, restoration projects will accelerate, anticipating the display needs at Campo and La Mesa. To complete all our projects in 1979 is going to take an incredible amount of work and dedicated involvement from each of us.

Every member is encouraged to become involved in some aspect of PSRMA's activities. Many and varied tasks await your attention. The first step is easy; call me at 291-4787 evenings and weekends and say "How can I help?" The association will be delighted to help you decide where you can make the greatest contribution to the museum needs. Besides, getting involved can be a lot of fun!

Monthly director's meetings are open to all PSRMA members. They are held on the first Tuesday of each month at 7:30 pm in the Board Room of the San Diego Trust and Savings Bank office building in downtown San Diego. Please attend; your ideas are welcome. See you all at the annual dinner meeting February 17th!

RESTORATION NEWS

The Holiday season is usually slack time in equipment restoration and maintenance, but in between the parties and family good times a lot was accomplished.

Saturday, December 30th saw nearly the entire crew down at the Santa Fe Depot to remove a complete Waukesha air conditioning system from member Gordon Ingram's private car "Los Angeles Club". Gordon is converting his car to diesel and donated all of the existing system, in excellent working order, to PSRMA. The car is a Budd observation built in 1947 and saw service on Northern Pacific's "North Coast Limited" and was called the "Tacoma Club" at that time. The car had been re-named the "Hulham" when acquired by Gordon several years ago.

It took all day for the crew to remove the heavy engine and compressor, propane tanks, sub cooler, reservoir and assorted plumbing and parts and get everything loaded in a small fleet of pickups. Dennis Massey came to the rescue with his four-wheel drive truck about the time the museum general manager realized the 1500 lb. engine unit would squash his little Datsun pickup. Dennis also handled a hastily rented fork lift with professional skill when the awkward Waukesha was transferred from his truck to our boxcar at Miramar. This equipment is exactly like the gear we have on Victoria and has become rare and expensive in the private car marketplace. The museum is happy to have this choice windfall and special thanks are due Gordon Ingram for thinking of us.

On another front, newly elected Director Knud Antonsen is re-building the battery charging system on our 45 ton diesel. The batteries we have been using were left by the Navy when they borrowed our engine last summer and need to be replaced. Knud is also cleaning the fuel system and filters that have become clogged with impurities. Knud was also in on the Waukesha move as was Russ Sargeant, "Nick" Nichols, Norm Hill, Ken Helm, Larry Rose, Tom Collins, Ron Milot, Dennis Massey, and, of course, as you might expect, Good Ol' Jack Linn.


NEW YEAR USHERED IN ON VICTORIA
