An oldtime cattle rustler became a part of Mr. Bundy's life story when he was called on to handle his notorious client's estate not too long ago.

At 10:00am GP-9's 705 and 721 coupled their eight loaded cars and caboose onto our plush conveyance and we were soon taking the switch at Escondido Jct., bound for the back country. Conductor Bill Hines sat at his desk in the crummey and read over the train order:
